Q1 How does Zora Neale Hurston fit into the Harlem Renaissance?

Zora Neale Hurston was absolutely part of the Harlem Renaissance. One of her key works is the 1937 novel 'Their Eyes Were Watching God' – which I think is superbly written. She was also an influential essayist – see her 1934 essay 'Characteristics of Negro Expression'. She contributed strongly to the debates within the movement, challenging primitivism and emphasizing that White education was not the only measure of intelligence. She was absolutely clear that Black people should be allowed to speak for themselves. She also challenged the idea that all works concerning Black people should be about 'the race problem', as this would also be a failure to see Black people in whole human terms.
